from the Louhs

God is generous and kind. He gives us so much, yet to whom much is given, we also know that much is expected (Luke 12:48). We remember in the parable of the bags of gold (Matthew 25:14-46) that we are called to use our gifts (whether money, skills, time, energy, education, intellect, strength, or influence) for good in this world. We are called to do the best we can, with what we have been given. But in this parable, there was one servant who chose to bury his talent in the ground, as an illustration to us of using our God given gifts for earthly pursuits (keeping them for ourselves, idleness, or letting our gifts be bound by fear or failure, worry about what others may think of us, or a fear of the hard work and responsibility involved in using them). But when we use our gifts, we know that it is pleasing to God and we are given more. So, not only do we need to be sure that our God given gifts are not going to waste or bound by earthly cares, but also that our work in this world, the use of our gifts must come from the heart and be an act of love.

After all, all of Christianity comes down to how we use our gifts to love God and to love others. Jesus tells us that the greatest commandment we have been given is to love God and secondly, to love others (Matthew 22:36-40). Therefore, we must aim to use our gifts and to do all things, out of a place of love.

Love outshines every gift from knowledge to influence and even our unique skills and abilities. Things done without love, profit us nothing.

So today, consider how well you are using your gifts, and consider how often you use your gifts from a place of love. How do we know if we are acting out of love? Remember to filter all you are doing through 1 Corinthians 13: 4-8; “Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy love does not parade itself, is not puffed up; does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.”

The Greatest Love Story

During the month of February, many celebrate Valentine's Day. It is a day we think of romance, love and relationships. As many will prepare to buy cards and gifts for their loved ones, I hope we will also recall the greatest love story the world has ever known—the one between God and His people, the one between God and His bride, which is the Church (John 3:29, Revelation 21:2)! It is through the Church, which our Lord “purchased with His own blood” (Acts 20:28), where we are most fully united to Christ and experience His abundant love.

The love story between God and His people begins with God's desire to be united to us. God created us out of non-existence into being for the sole purpose of communion with Him, of intimate fellowship with Him. The thing we have to remember is that God didn't have to create us; He wasn't forced to—God created us because He wanted to, because He cherishes us.

God's love is seen in that He not only came to us but that He lowered Himself in the process. The Word of God condescended to us, becoming one of us--the Immortal One became mortal; the King of Glory became a servant and washed the feet of his Disciples; the All-Powerful One was willing to experience pain, sorrow, suffering, mockery, rejection, abandonment and even death for us! It is not a coincidence that we begin the most sacred period of the Church year—Holy Week—with services which are called the “Bridegroom services”. According to the Scriptures, Christ is the Bridegroom and we, the Church, are His Bride. In addition, the icon of the Bridegroom services is the one depicting Christ with the crown of thorns on His head along with the robe of purple and the reed in His hand, given to Him for the purpose of mocking Him (Matthew 27:27-31).

Like the groom that will give his life for his wife

our Bridegroom—Christ--gives His life to us in the most humiliating and degrading way, showing the depths and the degree of His love for humanity. Like in every great love story, love conquers, and this is the case with Christ who conquered evil and death through His life-giving death on the Cross and His glorious Resurrection from the dead because of His immeasurable love for us.

Everything the Church does is meant to unite us to our God of love! At the 40-day baby blessing we are brought to the Church to be dedicated to God. Baptism unites us to God (Galatians 3:27). In Confession we experience God's love when we come in our vulnerability and brokenness and are instantly embraced by God, who cleanses us, forgives us and wipes away our tears. In Holy Communion we receive our Lord's Body and Blood. Everything the Church does is meant to bring us as close to God as possible.

The Bible itself is a love letter from God. The Divine Liturgy is a love banquet, where we join with the saints and angels in showering our Beloved with hymns of love! In the Divine Liturgy gifts of love are exchanged—our gifts of bread and wine are offered to God who in turn offers the gift of Himself to us. God's love for us is also seen with His desire to make us heirs of His eternal Kingdom where we will reign with Him forever (2 Timothy 2:12).

When Valentine's Day arrives my brothers and sisters in the Lord, let us not only reflect on the greatest love story that the world has ever known; let us also personally enter into and experience this love through the Church, the Divine Liturgy, the sacraments and the Scriptures.



A Guide to Greek Traditions and Customs in America is being highlighted by the St. Basil Bookstore for the month of February 2024. The book was compiled and published by Marilyn Rouvelas in 1993. The book was written with the Non-Orthodox Christian and Non-Greek in mind. It is a clear and comprehensive guide to answering all those questions circulating. For instance, "What is Koliva (memorial wheat)?" "What do the ingredients symbolize?" The book provides an easy-to-understand explanation of Orthodox and Greek traditions for the newcomer and for parishioners of Greek American heritage wishing to learn more.

If you are chosen to become a Godparent or witness a marriage (Koumbaroi) you will learn how to plan for a baptism or wedding, bake communion bread or name your baby. There are recipes provided to commemorate major feast days such as Easter and New Year's Day.

Marilyn Rouvelas is also a seasoned author of children's books which have been published and made available by Holy Cross Press: Peter Clashes with Anger, Eleni Looks at Jealousy and St. Anthony the Great! A Guide to Greek Orthodox Traditions and Customs will enable someone new to the Greek Orthodox Community to feel at home quickly as well as to broaden the lives of Greek American Orthodox families.

The Feast Day of our patron Saint, Basil the Great



January 1st marks the Feast Day of the Circumcision of our Lord as well as our patron Saint, Basil the Great. On this day, our Spiritual Shepherd, His Eminence Metropolitan Gerasimos of San Francisco, led us in worship for the Hierarchical Liturgy. After the service, there was a reception in the hall with the traditional cutting and distributing of the Vasilopita to our ministry leaders as well as the faithful.
